## VERMONT TOWNS


Vermont presently has 255 official political divisions ("places") in 14 counties. 237 places are chartered as towns, and nine are chartered as cities. Each town or city has an established government structure and elected representatives in the state legislature. There are also five unorganized towns, two of which were once organized, and three townships that never had large enough populations to be towns. To complete the 255 places there are four small, "leftover" tracts of land called gores which were never organized and have little or no population.

The nine Vermont cities are: Vergennes, Burlington, Rutland, Montpelier, Barre, St. Albans, Newport, Winooski and South Burlington. Vergennes, incorporated in 1788, was Vermont's first city and is the third oldest in the country. South Burlington is Vermont's newest city, created in 1971.

Within Vermont's towns there are a number of villages and other localities. There are about 50 villages that are incorporated, which means they are officially organized and have their own government within the town.


Vermont has a rich political history that forms the backdrop of the state map as it appears today. Most local affairs are handled at the town, city or village level. The annual town meeting is the manifestation of local democratic control, traditional in New England. In Vermont, the county government was established primarily as the seat of the court system. Each county does have a county seat, or shire town, (Bennington County is the exception with two "half-shires").

The Green Mountains are the dominant physical feature on Vermont's landscape, and for many years they formed a barrier between the eastern and western towns. This affected the state's political development. The state's capital rotated between towns east and west of the mountains for about 30 years before Montpelier became the permanent capital in 1808. Montpelier was chosen because of its central location and small, politically neutral population. For many years the state elected its governors and other officers alternately from east and west of the barrier to maintain politcal balance. This informal system of compromise was known as the "Mountain Rule" in Vermont's political geography.



#### Paul Wilson Leak

Paul Wilson Leak, a dedicated volunteer, died on October 8, 1995 at age 79. He was associated with our library for a number of years. Paul was a valued resource, possessing a vast genealogical knowledge. Canadian and English research were his recent specialties. Many people were helped through his guidance. Paul was involved with numerous projects around the library. He organized the microfilm, designed genealogical forms, set up shelves, and refinished tables. Many of his useful suggestions have been implemented. We will miss Paul and his enthusiasm. 
