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EASTERN CONNECTICUT GENEALOGICAL SOURCE



A small but useful genealogical library is housed at the John Baldwin House. It consists mainly of two Norwich genealogists' lifetime accumulation of notebooks tracing many Eastern CT families' lines. There are also a few reference books.

Mary E. Perkins, 1848-1935, was the daughter of Edmund Perkins and Elizabeth Wilkinson. She probably began her research sometime after the Civil War and published her masterwork, The Old Houses of the Antient Town of Norwich, in 1895. This was to have been followed by a series of softbound monographs on families in other parts of the city, but no more than the first issue of Old Families of Norwich was ever published. Miss Perkins' 400 notebooks of voluminous pedigree charts remain to represent her life's work and serve as guideposts for later researchers.

The second collection at the John Baldwin House was amassed by Eliza Warren Avery, (1871-1968). The daughter of William Avery and Lockie Payne Gorton, she was a teacher in Norwich and she is represented by articles in genealogical periodicals. The emphasis of her collection is on the founding families of the Eastern CT towns. She records descendants of these families for two, three and sometime four generations.

This means that Avery's material concentrate in the 1600s and early 1700s whereas Perkins' often traces families into the last of the 19th Century if not into the 1900s. Neither woman was very rigorous about citing sources so that a researcher is left still to search out primary sources, but these collections can be a valuable start for the family historian.

Researchers are welcome. It is well to call ahead however to be sure that a block of time is available. There is a fee of one dollar per person for use of the library.

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
#### Ireland

# PAINTING HAS SUCCESSFUL HOMECOMING

John Frederick Kensett's "Niagra" came home to Simsbury and was exhibited at our library from May 7th to May 14th. Over three hundred people viewed the painting during the week. "Niagra", painted in 1855, hung at the Eno Memorial Hall for over fifty years. For the last few years, the painting has been at the Wadsworth Atheneum. If you missed it during its recent return to Simsbury, you can still view it at the Atheneum. "Niagra" is a real treasure.



#### FAMILIES WITH HOMESTEADS/DEEDS

In May, 1862, the U.S. Congress passed the Homestead Act giving citizens (or immigrants who wished to be citizens) 160 free acres of land with certain requirements. These usually stipulated that a home be built on the land, that it be cultivated and that the recipient live there five years.

In 1872 it was amended to help Union veterans (or widows). Between 400,000 and 600,000 families were given farms due to this legislation. The homestead process required filing a claim, application, form of intention, proof, testimony of witnesses, naturalization papers and/or discharge papers from the Union army. Subject matter included lifestyle of the homesteaders, names, locations, ages etc. It is not difficult to obtain the homested application but you MUST have the legal description of the property.

Determine this through census records of the township, then check plat maps to find the section etc. and check for deed records of legal description. You can write to the National Archives to obtain copies of the file by giving the complete legal description, county and names of claimants. NA will give you a price quote and mail to you following receipt of payment. Homestead records appear in record group 49 of the NA.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has computerized more than one million homestead and cash deeds dated from the late 1790s to 1908 for the following states: AR, LA, FL, MS, OH, MI, MN and WI. The remainder of the easterN public domain states (MO, IA, IN, IL and AL) and all patent deeds after 1908 will be automated by year 2000.

Copies are available at 7450 Boston Blvd., Springfield, VA 22153. PH: (703) 440-1600. Anyone with PC and ModeM can dial into BLM system to view the data and request a fax or printed copy. Note: Women's citizenship status depended on that of their husbands or fathers, so until 1922 they were not required to file for naturalization.
